# Curriculum

The online Bachelor of General Studies – Psychology program mirrors the on-campus version offered at the University of Kansas. All Psychology major courses are offered in an eight-week format. An evaluation of any transfer credits will determine what is required to complete the program.

## Course Requirements

### I. Introductory courses (13 credit hours):

- MATH 101: College Algebra (prerequisite)
- PSYC 102: Orientation Seminar in Psychology (1 credit)
- PSYC 104: General Psychology (3 credits)
- PSYC 200: Research Methods in Psychology (3 credits)
- PSYC 210: Statistics in Psychological Research (3 credits)

### II. Core courses (15 credit hours):

- PSYC 318: Cognitive Psychology (3 credits)
- PSYC 333: Child Development (3 credits)
- PSYC 350: Abnormal Psychology (3 credits)
- PSYC 360: Social Psychology (3 credits)
- PSYC 375: Cognitive Neuroscience (3 credits)

### III. Diversity, Equity, and Ethical Behavior (3 credit hours):

- PSYC 465: Stereotyping and Prejudice Across Cultures

### III. Electives in Psychology (12 credit hours).

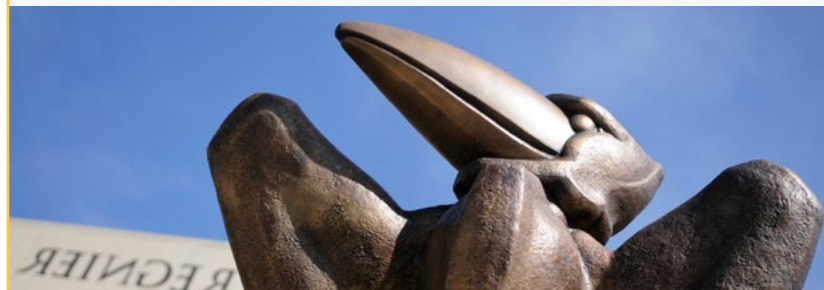

### IV. Minor (18 credit hours). Students are required to complete a minor in a department other than Psychology\*

\*Students have the option to complete a minor or petition to complete two certificates instead.

## University Requirements

- All KU undergraduate students are required to complete the six goals of the KU core
  - Critical Thinking & Quantitative Literacy (6 credit hours, 2 courses)
  - Communication (9 credit hours, 3 courses)
  - Breadth of Knowledge (9 credit hours, 3 courses)
  - Culture & Diversity (6 credit hours, 2 courses)
  - Social Responsibility & Ethics (3 credit hours, 1 course)
  - Integration & Creativity (3 credit hours, 1 course)
- All KU undergraduate students are required to take 120 overall credit hours of applicable degree credit.
- Of those 120 overall credit hours, 45 must be taken at the junior/senior (300+) level.
- Of those 45 junior/senior-level credit hours, 30 must be taken in residence at KU **(includes KU online)**.
- A minimum GPA of 2.0 in KU coursework is required for graduation.
